July 2023

Chris Walker – The Great American Songbook

Our meeting happens to fall on July 4^{th} - American Independence Day – so what better way to celebrate this than by hearing the first of a series of talks from Chris Walker on 'The Great American Songbook'. With the help of rare archive and video material, Chris will illustrate just how the great songs of the 20th century were originated and performed.

Chris is well known in the local jazz scene, playing the clarinet and fronting 'The Chris Walker Swingtet'.

August 2023

Kevin Patience - The Man Who Never Was

Kevin's life story could be a talk in itself – grew up in Kenya, served in the RAF, became a commercial diver, and latterly has published several books on military history.

Members may be partly familiar with the subject of his talk, as it has been made into a film. Code named Operation Mincemeat, in April 1943 a body dressed as a Royal Marine officer with briefcase was deliberately washed ashore in Spain, designed to fool the Germans that the allies planned to invade Greece and not Sicily. Kevin tells us that he will give 'the true story of this deception'!

September 2023

Alan Pickford – The People's Mosquito

Members may recall that our speaker last October was Des Curtis, who we have come to know as he is the Speaker Secretary at Bournemouth 1 Probus Club. Des had a distinguished war record, having completed over 70 sorties as the navigator in a de Havilland Mosquito, and was awarded the DFC.

Des in turn has introduced us to Alan Pickford who is heavily involved in the building of a new Mosquito through private funding – the first Mosquito to be produced in the UK for more than 70 years – hence 'The People's Mosquito' which has registered charity status.

October 2023

Mark Watts – Winchester Prison – Past and Present

Last year's Probus holiday in Dartmoor included a memorable visit to the museum at Dartmoor Prison, so Mark's talk should make an appropriate follow-up.

He is the former head of security at Winchester Prison, and gives a talk based on his experiences, which is both informative and amusing.

November 2023

Steve Parselle – The Life of an Army Chaplain

Steve is a retired Anglican priest, who was an Army Chaplain for many years. He is known to a number of our members, having given talks locally about some of his experiences – often humorous ones - during those times. Steve has many stories to share!

December 2023

Ken Fowler – The Yodare Sailing Challenge

'Yodare' was an epic sailing challenge to become the first ever single handed dinghy to sail around ALL the islands of England and Wales. That's a grand total of over 250 islands and over 1200 miles of sailing, all in a dinghy as small as two bath tubs – and just as wet! The aim was to raise around £50,000 for Cancer Research and Oakhaven Hospice.

But it was quite a story – as we shall hear!

Chicken breast coq au vin. Roasted chicken breast with caremelised onions, mushrooms and bacon in red wine sauce.

Baked and stuffed field mushrooms. (V)

Smoked haddock rarebit, Smoked haddock fillet on a bed of wilted spinach with mustard and cheese glaze.

Spinach rarebit with poached eggs (V)

Treacle tart with marmalade ice.

Dex Christmas lunch, slices of turkey and all the trimmings.

Mushroom and lentil nut roast with all the trimmings (V)
